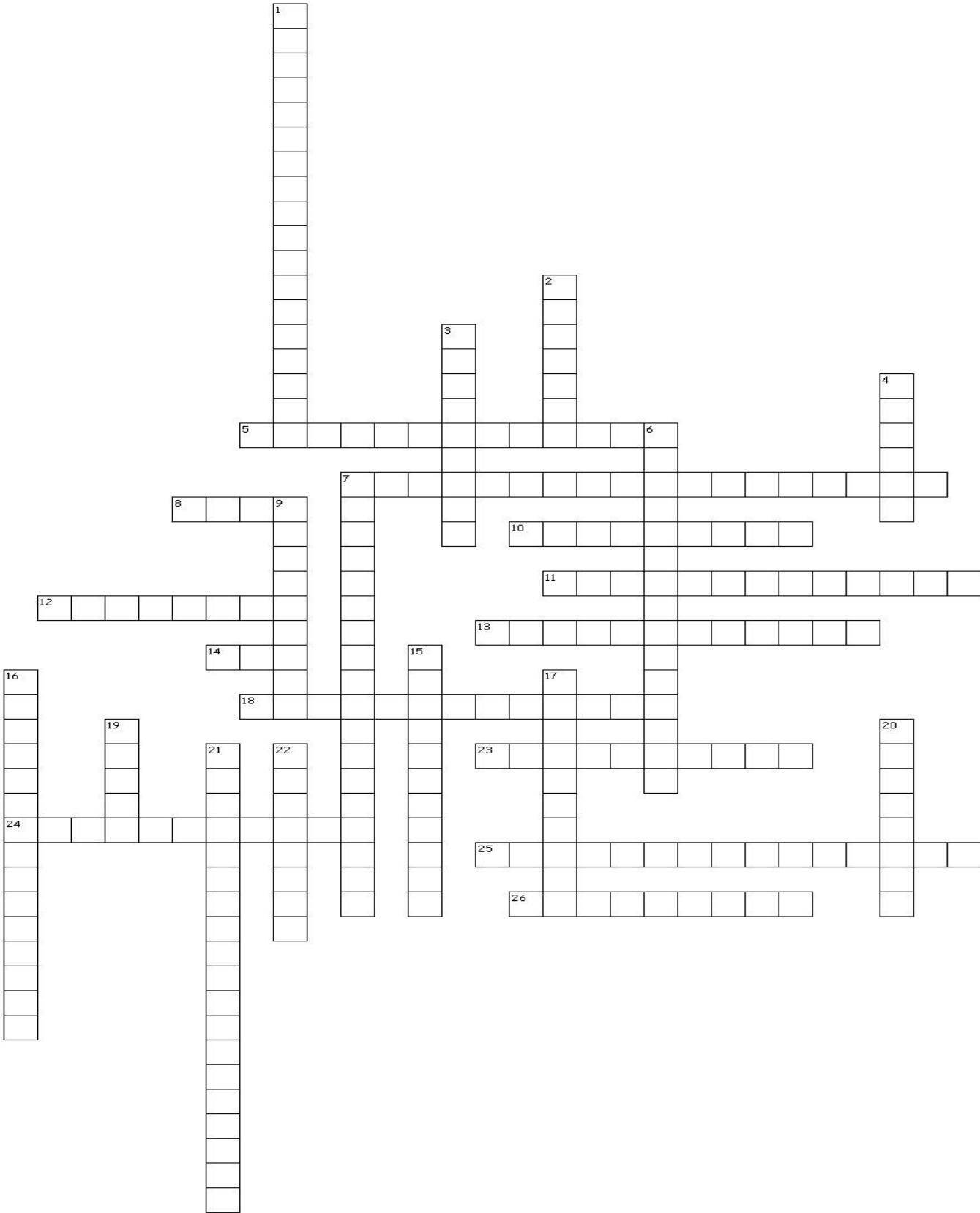

5. When a juvenile commits 3 or more DUI's within a 60 month period; commits another DUI and drives on a suspended or revoked license; or drives under the influence of alcohol or drugs with a passenger under the age of 15 years old.
7. A proceeding in the juvenile court to determine whether a child has committed a specific delinquent act.
8. The abbreviation for the state agency which operates locked facilities where juvenile live and receive treatment and rehabilitation services.
10. This is the process of requiring a juvenile to attend specific programs rather than having charges filed. The programs include things such as educational programs, community service, paying restitution or a fine.
11. An act which, if committed by an adult, would be a crime.
12. Also known as a complaint, this is a document used by the police department, schools, other legal authorities, or parents to refer a juvenile to the juvenile court system.
13. The legal term used to describe the point at which parents are no longer responsible for their children and children are no longer answerable to their parents. This usually occurs at the age of 18.
14. A term for Driving Under the Influence of drugs or alcohol.
18. An act committed by a juvenile with penalties that include probation, community service, fines, and losing your driver's license. These are acts which are unlawful for juveniles but not for adults.
23. A justice court, municipal court or criminal division of the Superior Court that can hear offenses committed by adults.
24. Paying a victim for his/her economic loss.
25. This is held to decide if the juvenile might have done the act which is charged. It also determines whether a juvenile will have his or her trial in Juvenile Court or in Adult court.
26. The temporary locking up of a juvenile in a locked, physically secure county facility that limits entrance and exit.

1. Also known as sentencing, it is a hearing at which the court makes final decisions about a case.
2. A person against whom a complaint, petition or indictment is filed.
3. One of the consequences for delinquent juveniles, this is the term for supervision of a juvenile in the community by county probation officers. The juvenile must follow the rules set out by the court and probation officer.
4. This is a classification of crime. Felonies are ranked one through six with one being the most serious. Felonies are the most serious of crimes which are offenses generally punishable by death or prison.
6. Also known as a status offense, these are acts which are unlawful for juveniles but not adults.
7. A juvenile who is found after a hearing to have committed a delinquent act.
9. Also known as a referral, this is document used by the police department, schools, other legal authorities, or parents to refer a juvenile to the juvenile court system.
15. This is a classification of crime. Misdemeanors are ranked one through three with one being the most serious. Misdemeanors are less serious than felonies.
16. A formal hearing held after a petition has been filed against a juvenile.
17. Also known as prison, this is confining a juvenile for treatment and rehabilitation in a facility that limits entrance and exit and which is surrounded by a locked and physically secure barrier.
19. A person eighteen years of age or older.
20. Anyone under the age of eighteen.
21. Also known as a trial, this is the hearing at which it is determined whether the juvenile is adjudicated of the charges.
22. The document to file a formal charge by the county attorney alleging delinquency, incorrigibility or dependency.
