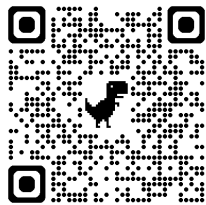


In grades K-12? Scan the QR code and use the voter I.D. to vote in the KVAZ General Election! The ballot is open September 10th through election day.

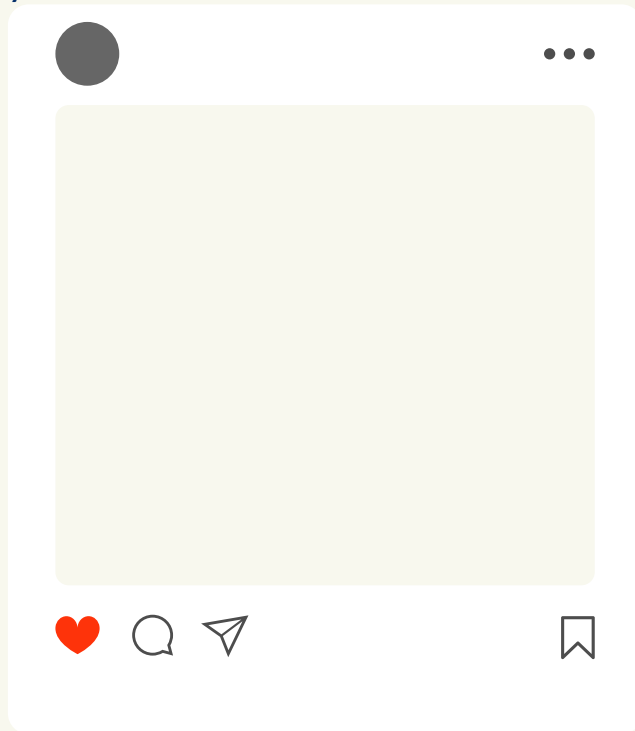

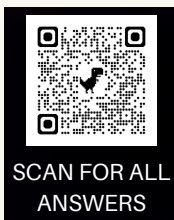
ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES TO DO WITH YOUR FAMILY!

- 1 Sign up for a library card at your local library. You can check out books about past Presidents and learn the roles they have played in shaping history.
- 2 Watch the debates as a family and talk with your families about both sides of the issues.
- 3 Volunteer for a campaign.
- 4 Contact a candidate if you have questions by writing them a letter or sending an email.
- 5 Ask a family member to take you with them to the poll when they go to vote. Or, if they vote by mail, sit with them while they vote.
- 6 Watch the live election results on the day of the election and color in a map to keep track of the electoral college votes.
- 7 Watch the Presidential Inauguration Speech.

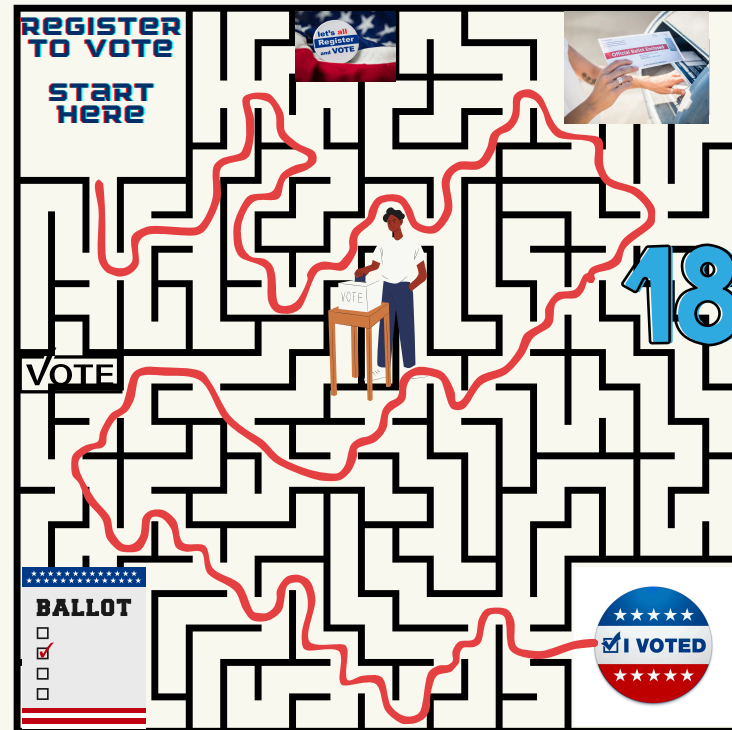

One single vote can make all the difference. Throughout history, people have fought very hard so their voice could be heard. Today, every American over the age of 18 has the right to vote. There are many ways to vote, and many laws are passed based on these votes, so a small number can make a big difference. There are three ways to vote in an election:

1. Mail-in-Ballot;
2. Voting in person at a polling location; or
3. Mailing in an absentee ballot.*

An example of someone who would need an absentee ballot is a citizen who lives overseas, like a soldier.

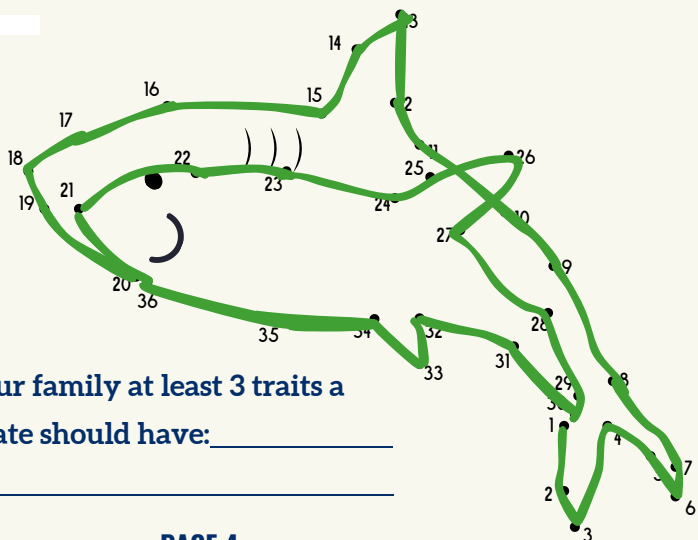

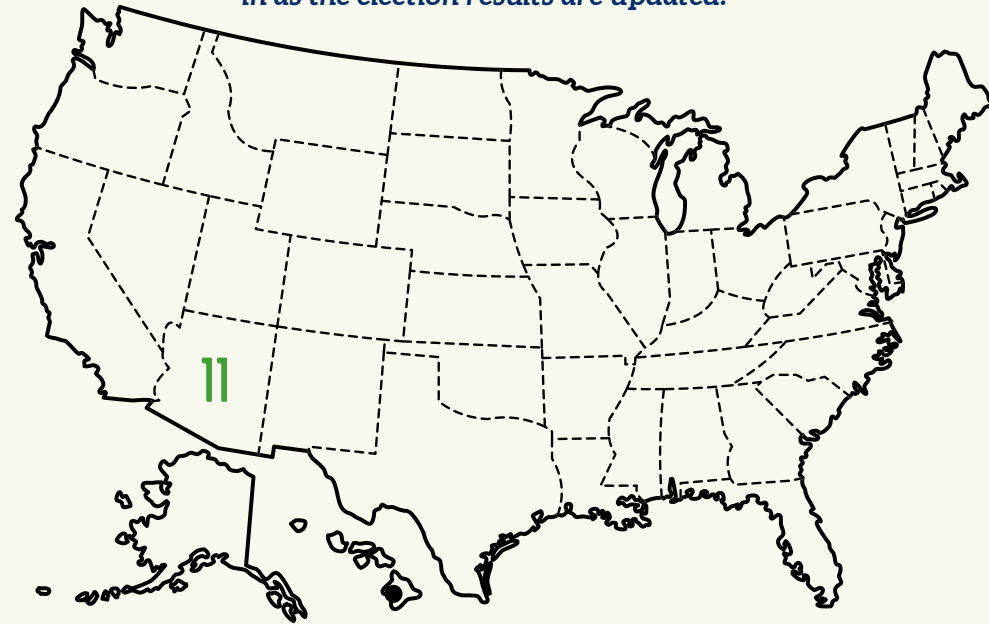

WHO WILL WIN THE ELECTORAL COLLEGE?

The Electoral College, a chosen group of citizens, makes the final vote for President. Each state is assigned a certain number of votes based on the number of people who live in a state. There are a total of 538 electors and a Presidential Candidate must win 270 of these votes.

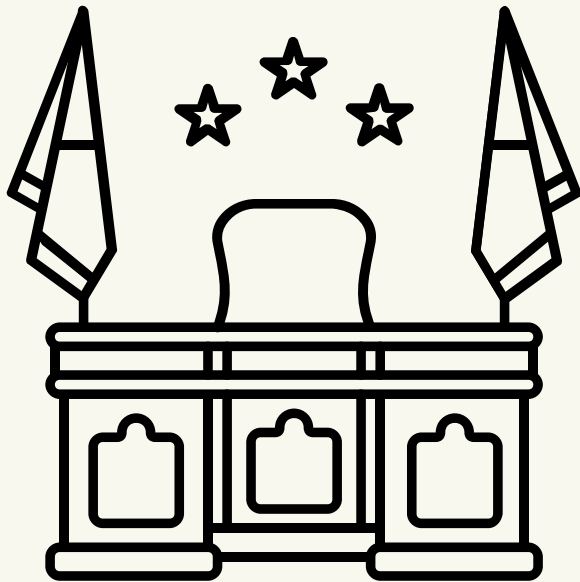
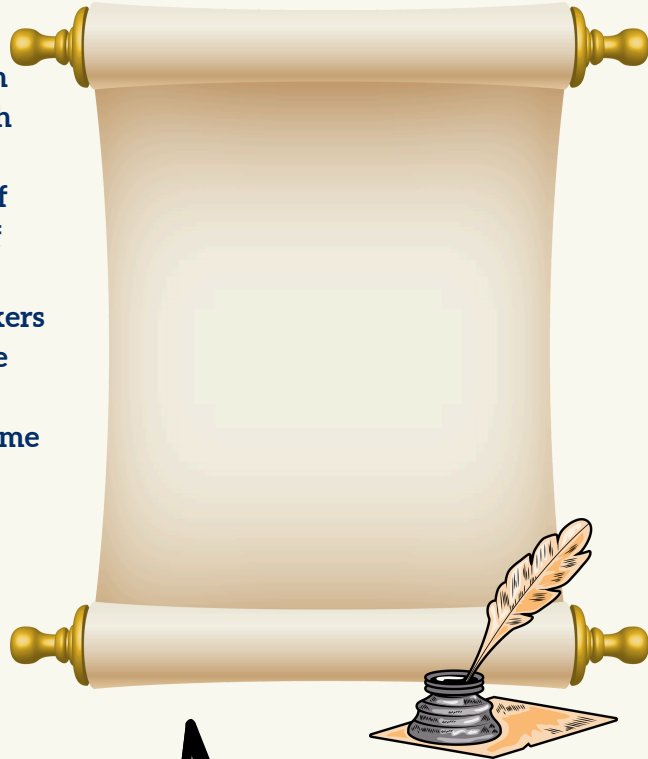

LEGISLATIVE, EXECUTIVE, & JUDICIAL

Article I of our Constitution sets up our Legislative Branch (Congress). This branch makes our laws. Our Congress is made up of Senators and House of Representatives. We vote for these lawmakers to represent us! On the right, list 2 ideas you would like to see become a law.



Article II of the Constitution sets up our Executive Branch. The Executive branch enforces the laws. It is made up of the President, Vice President, and the Cabinet (advisors) to the President. Design, decorate, and color the oval office to the left.

YOUR 3 BRANCHES OF GOVERNMENT

Article III of the Constitution sets up our Judicial Branch. The Judicial Branch interprets the laws. It is made up of the Supreme Court. There are 9 justices who interpret the Constitution to make the laws relevant for today. Find the words to learn more!
