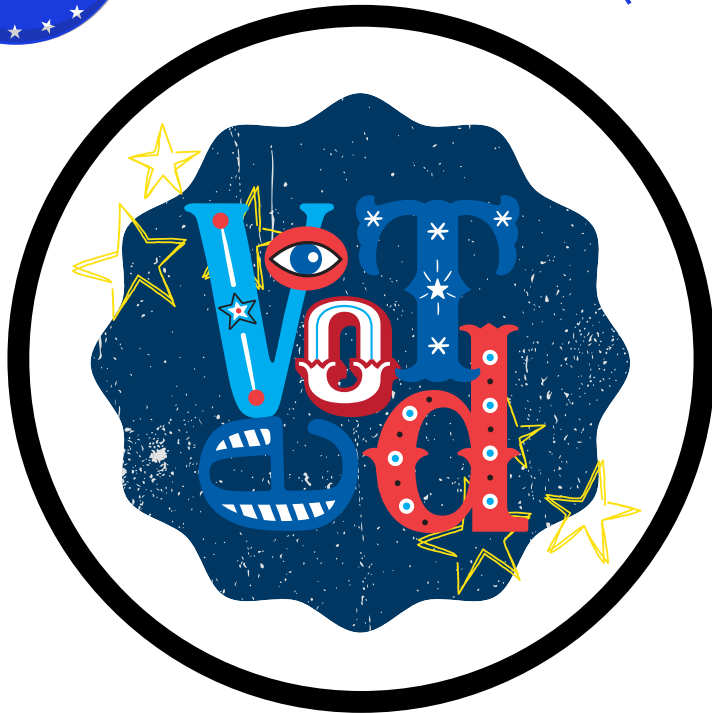

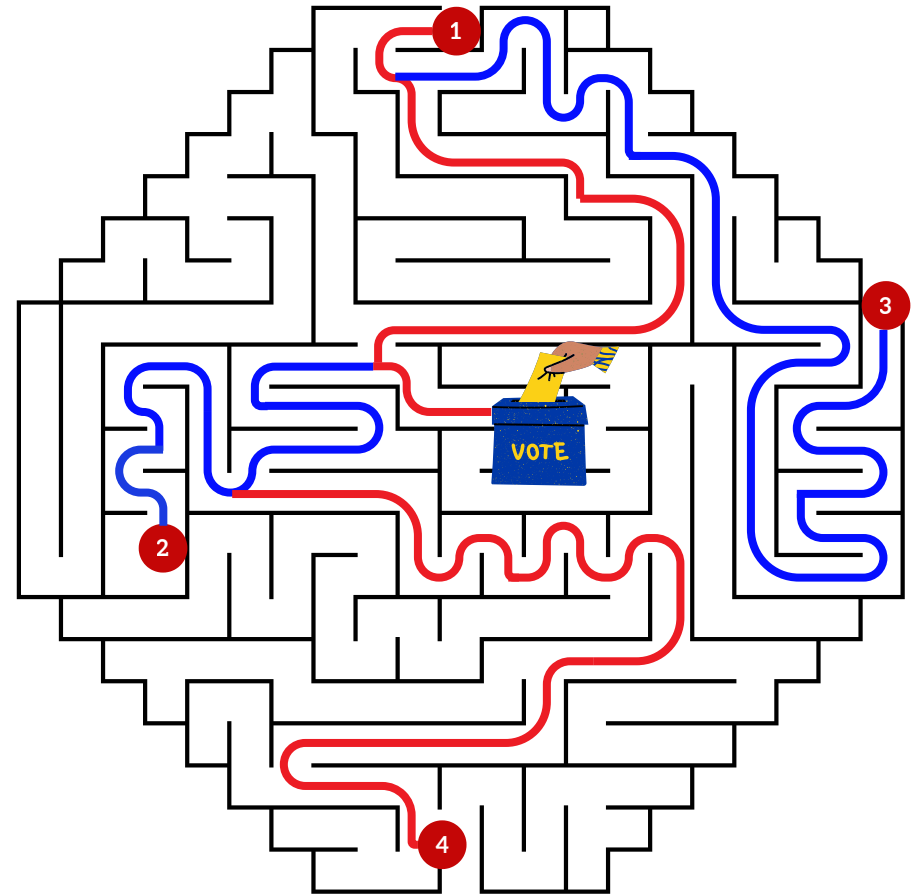

PREPARE, PRACTICE, AND BECOME INFORMED

Welcome to the Kids Voting Maze! Each number on the maze reminds you how to make an informed choice. Find your way to the ballot box starting at each number.



- 1 Research the candidates with a family member.
- 2 Watch the debate and listen to what each candidate says.
- 3 Write down information you think is important.
- 4 Select the candidate(s) you would like to serve for each office.

KEEP TALKING

ADDITIONAL ACTIVITIES TO DO WITH YOUR FAMILY!

- 1 Sign up for a library card at your local library. You can check out books about Arizona and learn about the role elections have played in shaping history.
- 2 Watch the debates as a family and talk with your families about both sides of the issues.
- 3 Volunteer for a campaign.
- 4 Ask a family member to take you with them to the polls when they go vote. If they vote by mail, sit with them while they vote.
- 5 Watch the live election results on the day of the election and color in a map of Arizona to keep track of the county votes.
- 6 Celebrate election day with some red, white, and blue snacks!
- 7 Watch the Governor's Inauguration Speech.

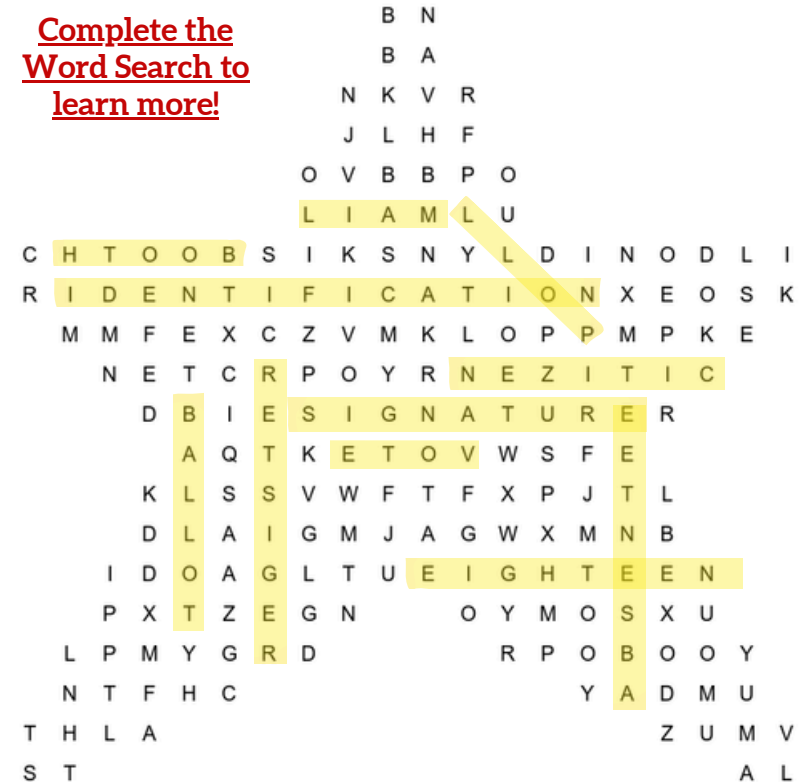
WAYS TO VOTE

There are three ways to vote in an election:

1. Mail-in-ballot
2. Voting in person at a polling location (voting booth); or
3. Mailing in an absentee ballot.*

*An example of someone who would need an absentee ballot is a citizen who lives overseas, like a soldier.

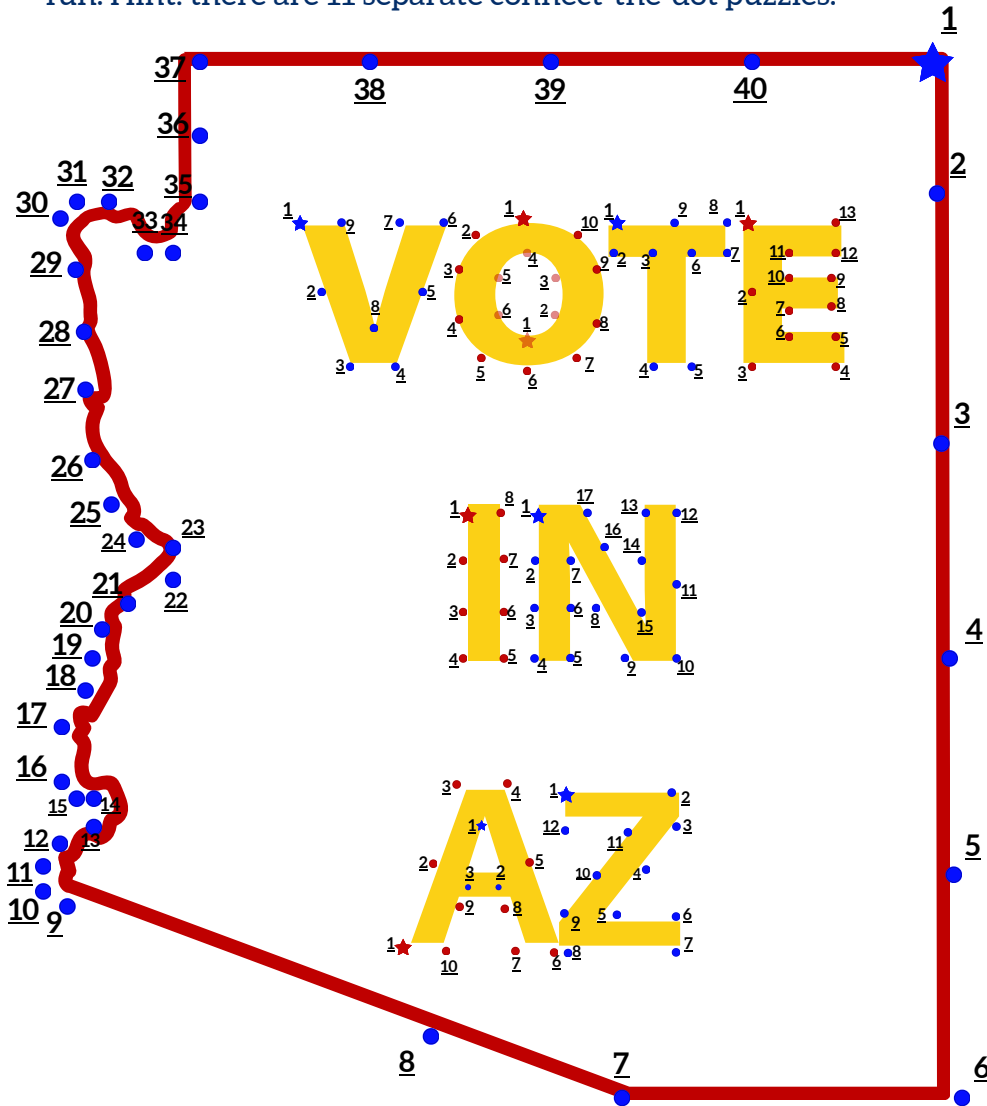

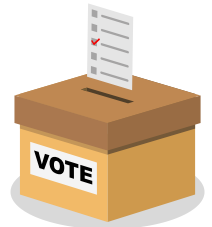

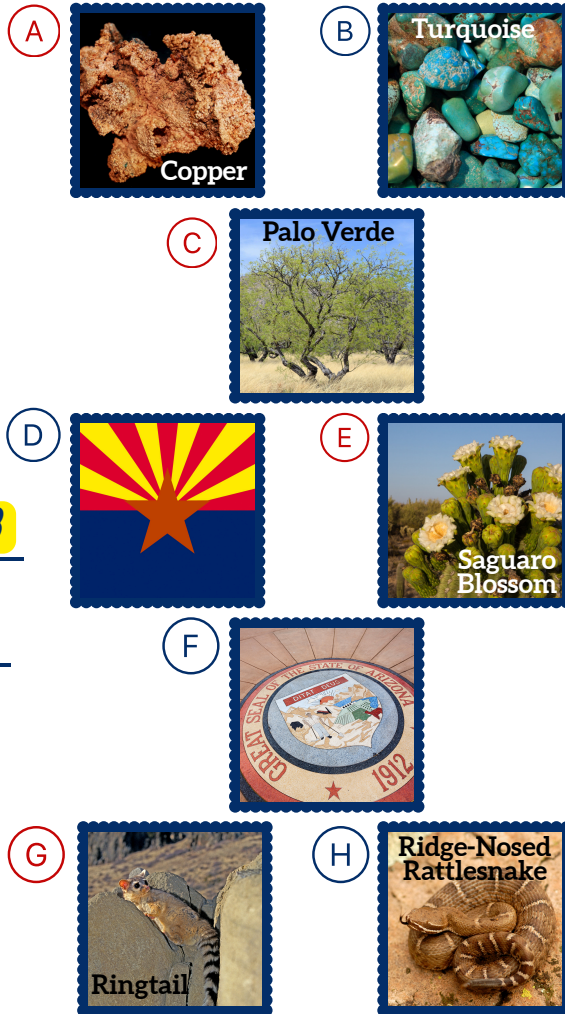
