# **The Problem and its causes** (pg. 1)

# **Evidence of the Problem** (pg. 1)

Homeless people are trying to make their own homeless shelters and are begging people for money or trying to make money, and homeless people are trying to afford food, clothes, water, etc. Also, homelessness is associated with poor health compared to low-income populations with housing, people experiencing homelessness have a higher prevalence of acute and chronic physical and mental health conditions and higher mortality rates.

# **Evidence of the Problem** (pg. 2)

Poor hygiene, unmet medical/dental needs, wearing the same clothes repeatedly, fatigue, hoarding food. According to the article health affairs people experiencing homelessness have a higher prevalence and chronicle and mental health. Homelessness can lead social stigma and cause isolation which it make it difficult to maintain a stable net worth.

# **Evidence of the Problem** (pg. 3)

Homeless people can't afford a home so therefore they can't take showers and groom which this leads to them to not be able to get a job. Evidence that homelessness is a problem because there's poverty and lack of good affordable housing and there no people to help them or give them a boost to get back on their feet.

# **Issues Involved with the Problem** (pg. 1)

The issues involved with homelessness are domestic violence that can lead to many problems. One major issue involved with homelessness is the lack of good paying jobs. The average paying job in Arizona is 10-21 dollars per hour which is not a lot. Also Arizona continues to have a very high eviction rate and current programs are assisting too few households that are at high risk of being evicted.

# **Existing / Current Policy** (pg. 1)

Arizona department of housing is giving 44.6million into housing to help people in arizona to find affordable housing and giving them a boost to help them in making a living and giving them a fresh start.

# **Existing / Current Policy** (pg. 2)

ADOH provided over \$46.6 million in public resources to combat the issue, including \$16.4 million for a myriad of programs to avoid or move people out of homelessness and an investment of over \$30.2 million in financing to develop 127 new permanent supportive housing units.

# **Existing / Current Policy** (pg. 3)

The DES Homeless Coordination Office, using a combination of federal and state funds, contracts with not for profit and local government entities to provide the following services directly throughout the state: rapid rehousing. Emergency shelter homeless prevention.

# **Disagreements about the Problem** (pg. 1)

The Dept. of Housing and Urban Development has stated that Arizona makes up 2% in the USA's unhoused population.
